Ha'ikū resident Jacqueline Simone Ambrose, an amateur videographer, has entered her short documentary, *Carina Wells Project Tabora Tanzania*, in an online, international film contest sponsored by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. She needs your votes to become a finalist, which will help with her mission to relieve the dire water situation in Tabora.

Mothers and children, who are responsible for fetching water, walk up to three miles daily, often finding only dirty, contaminated water. And their relentless search negatively impacts school attendance.

Ambrose, who grew up in Tanzania, has worked on water issues in the Tabora district since 2004. The Carina Water Wells Project (www.carinawaterwells.org) is dedicated to the memory of her daughter, Carina who died that year.

In 2009, Ambrose completed a well for Kwihala Village in the Tabora district and a rainwater catchment tank for the village school with funds from the Rotary Club of Maui.

Ambrose is the project manager for Aloha Shares Network, and a marketing and sales representative for Maui Recycling Service.

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
